

President's Message - Charlie Sell

The following is a Q&A with the editor and the DCPOA president.

Editor: The Master Board and the Office have been communicating to residents extensively via email. Are you reaching everybody in the community this way?

Charlie: In order to ensure all owners receive important mass communication from our management staff, we continue to encourage everyone to register for the website at www.condominiumassociates.com.

We have about 80% cooperation in the community so far and we are still spreading the word. We've had plenty of positive feedback about our communications and want to make sure everyone is included. Unfortunately duplication in the posting of signs is still required to reach everyone.

Editor: Having *Currents by the Cay* online connects with our residents who haven't yet or are unable to return. Is there something special you would like to say to them?

Charlie: We miss the residents that have not been able to return to DC. We especially miss our Canadian and European residents and friends. Stay healthy and we look forward to seeing you on the property soon.

Editor: The extensive new street paving looks really nice. How did the project go this summer?

Charlie: I was not looking forward to the paving and sealing project. We were delayed on our first start date because the city was very slow in getting our permits since permitting was heavily backed up due to Covid-19. When we finally received our permits it was already July and the start of the rainy season. Residents were given lots of information about the process with regular updates. Everything went smoothly in the end with only some minor inconveniences.

Editor: The ongoing business of maintaining a community of this size, in addition to a vast nature preserve, doesn't stop because of Covid-19. What projects have you worked on that you would like to highlight?

Charlie: Yes, there are always projects here at DC. This summer we had to replace the filtration system in the front pond. It's under the control of Swift Mud with regular inspections dictated. A contract was set up for regular beach raking and it seems to be going well. The Board approved a car vacuum for the car wash area. However, it took us four months to get it and once again, we are waiting for city permitting for the electrical work necessary. I learned a lot about fencing requirements and solutions for our pools and what would make the insurance companies happy. They require fences for safety in order to renew our coverage at a reasonable price.



Editor: There are nice new seating areas in the bandstand on the east end of Spoonbill Lake and it's a great use of space. How did this come about?

Charlie: We have had this beautiful area for a long time and it's never used. With the help of Van Williams we purchased heavy-duty concrete tables and benches. It's a good spot from which to view the sunset over Spoonbill Lake and just to visit with neighbors. It's nice to see it being used.



Editor: As a resident, Dolphin Cay feels like a really secure place to live. Nevertheless, you continue to make improvements. What enhancements have you made recently?

Charlie: Recently we invited the City of St.

Petersburg Police Department to review our
property for security. As a result of that assessment,
we made some modifications and enhancements.
Our gatehouse security staff is now securing the
license number, make and model of vehicles
entering the property. Information is also recorded
with our new cameras for all vehicles entering and
leaving the property. We have improved the lighting
around the gatehouse so the guards have better
visibility of what's going on around them.

Editor: Any last words you want to leave us with?

Charlie: I know everyone is saying it has been a tough year and we are all anxious for good things to happen next year. We have been very lucky with only one case of the virus reported on the property.

I want to thank the Board and building presidents for helping to put rules in effect that would help us contain things. Those rules are still in effect until the numbers in the county get better.

I would be remiss if I didn't mention the great and tireless effort put in by our management team led by Sue Ortiz, our property manager.

Regardless of what happens next year, we will continue to do the right things to protect the health and safety of our residents.

Once all fencing has been fully installed, we hope to utilize the beautiful landscaping elements of Dolphin Cay to help hide as much of them as possible.

It is important to note insurance rates are going up everywhere, but we strive to keep our costs in line by making the best possible decisions based on the choices available to us.

Now... About Our Mangrove Neighbors ...

the Raccoons ...

Originally raccoons lived in the tropics but over time they moved north up the continent, successfully adapting to new territories and expanding their diet. Here are samples of raccoon sounds you might hear: https://www.soundboard.com/sb/raccoon_sounds_audio

Raccoons have a highly developed sense of touch considered to be superior to other non-primate mammals. The five toes on a raccoon's front paws are extremely dexterous, functioning essentially as five little fingers which allow it to grasp and manipulate food. The name raccoon is derived from the Algonquin Indians and translates to "he scratches with his hands".



Raccoons have been spotted in the springtime, also outside of the mangroves. One myth is if they are seen out in the daytime, they must be rabid. Not necessarily so. Although they are nocturnal, it is quite common for a healthy animal to venture out during the day if it is hungry or its den has been destroyed. Frequently, the mother raccoons nursing kits will be forced to search for food and water night and day.

... and the shore-line Ospreys

The Osprey is perhaps the bird most emblematic of Dolphin Cay and its distinctive call is familiar to us all. For a close-up view of an Osprey and to hear its call click here: https://www.allaboutbirds.org/guide/Osprey/sounds#

The Osprey is often seen flying over the water, hovering, and then plunging feet-first to catch fish in its talons. They are unusual among hawks in possessing a reversible outer toe that allows them to grasp with two toes in front and two behind. Barbed pads on the soles of the birds' feet help them grip slippery fish. When flying with prey, an Osprey lines up its catch head first for less wind resistance.



An Osprey may log more than 160,000 migration miles during its 15-to-20-year lifetime. During 13 days in 2008, one Osprey flew 2,700 miles from Martha's Vineyard to French Guiana, South America.

The name "Osprey" made its first appearance around 1460, via the Medieval Latin phrase for "bird of prey" (*avis prede*) as they are excellent anglers, with a success rate in catching prey in 1 of every 4 dives, sometimes as high as 70 percent.



Committee & Organization Reports

Architectural Review Committee - Cliff Allen

The Architectural Review Committee (ARC) is fundamental to evaluate proposed renovations to Dolphin Cay properties in order to uphold standards of safety, structural integrity, appearance, and conformity.

Condominium and single family home residents must submit a Request for Improvements before a project starts. Forms are obtained from the office.

To expedite the ARC assessment, please provide as much detail as possible on changes, their location, engineering, and brochure specifics about materials. For condominium floor coverings, a sample of the covering and underlayment must be provided to the Office.

The ARC works with management to keep up to date on materials and techniques for renovations. Request forms are updated as needed. For example, there is a new requirement for waterproofing membranes required to be laid down on deck and balcony flooring. You can obtain the most current Request Forms from the Office and they can also be seen in the updated online Resident Information Packet at www.dolphincay.com.

The ARC and the Management Office do not like to recommend a person, a company or a product, although if we are aware of a problem we will pass that information to you. The best recommendations come from your neighbors.


Health & Fitness Committee
