We have lost a lot of good people this past year. People who loved this community and are missed every day. People who moved in 10, 15, 25 years ago and never left. We still have numerous original residents and they might move from a house to a condo or from building to building, but it says something when people look to move, but they are definitely not leaving Dolphin Cay.

In the recent months, we have had new residents, new vendors, and had to do several interviews for a couple of staff positions throughout the property. Going through these exercises and meeting people who are new to the community is always a healthy reminder of what we have built over the last 25 years. The compliments pour in while they look in amazement at the beauty of Dolphin Cay. For most, they cannot believe a property like this exists in St Petersburg and this is the first time they are discovering it. As beautiful as it may be, I hope you take a minute to not only appreciate the aesthetic value of Dolphin Cay but also see the value in the people of this community.

We recently had a Board Certification Course where 20 Board members were present. We may disagree on minor things but is rare to see such a large group of people all working towards a common goal of community. My coworkers outside of Dolphin Cay do not believe me when I tell them I've only sent one violation in the last year, or that we do not need dog stations because people have common decency and sense of pride in the community, or that I



rarely deal with a delinquency and it usually only requires a phone call to resolve.

I could go on and on. It cannot be measured; you cannot put a dollar amount on it. A sense of community is something we may feel is lacking in society today, but when you drive up to the gatehouse, you should know you are coming home to something better.

In my opinion, Dolphin Cay is a prime example of what other associations should strive to be every day.

Water- A list of cautions for the good of you and your neighbors

- We have had a few water leaks this month at Dolphin Cay. The issue lately has been the protocol and procedure for reporting these water leaks, rather than responsibility. Owners should know that they must contact the Management Office immediately as stated in 718.111 of the Dolphin Cay By-Laws. The Association Manager's 'Winter 2017' Currents by the Cay article went into some of the details related to this topic. Past issues can be found at dolphincay.com If residents do not contact the Management Office, they could be held responsible for the entire cost of any repairs.
 - o From Dolphin Cay By-Laws: All reconstruction work after a property loss must be undertaken by the association except as otherwise authorized in this section. A unit owner may undertake reconstruction work on portions of the unit with the prior written consent of the board of administration. However, such work may be conditioned upon the approval of the repair methods, the qualifications of the proposed contractor, or the contract that is used for that purpose. A unit owner must obtain all required governmental permits and approvals before commencing reconstruction.
- Turn off the water to your entire home when you are away. This is easy and prevents damage to your home or your neighbors'.
- Air conditioners have drains that can become clogged and leak water into your home. To prevent this from happening, pour a cup of bleach or vinegar into the access opening in the drain line near the AC unit every month to kill any algae, mold, or mildew that has formed in the pipe. For help on the specifics of this process, contact your air conditioner repair company.
- Washing machines have hoses that can develop leaks as they age. These can be easily replaced with sturdier material, just to make sure the old ones do not break and leak water into your home.
- To detect any water leak before it becomes a problem, purchase and place several water alarms in your home. This alarm can detect as little as 1/32 inch of water and produces a loud 110 dB alarm that can be heard throughout the home and by your neighbors to provide an effective early warning system. The water alarm can be placed directly on floors: near water heaters, refrigerators or dishwashers, next to washing machines, under sinks, close to air conditioner drain tubes, near toilets, or wherever there is a risk of water damage. Let your neighbors know to take action if they hear your alarm.

These water alarms are inexpensive and available from many stores including Lowes, Home Depot, and Amazon.

Please remember Hurricane Irma!

Many absent residents left items outside on their balconies and patios that needed to be moved before the hurricane arrived here in Dolphin Cay. Many, many hours were spent by neighbors and staff moving furniture and plants inside and keeping everyone and the property safe. There were also some problems with finding keys to apartments so that this emergency work could be performed. Make sure the office has access to your key while you are away!

If you are planning to be away from your Dolphin Cay home:

- Ensure that the Management Office has your non-Dolphin Cay address, phone number, and an emergency contact name and telephone number.
- Make sure to leave a key to your home in your DCPOA building lockbox in case of emergency.
- Turn off the water supply to your unit (the valve may be located in the utility closet). Turn off the circuit breaker for the water heater.
- Stop mail and newspaper delivery.
- Your automobile may be left in your assigned parking space. Leave a car key in your apartment in case of a need to move your vehicle. Notify the office as to the location of the key.
- Leave the air conditioner on and set appropriately to prevent mildew.
- Remove perishables from the refrigerator. Turn the refrigerator off (optional), place an open box of baking soda
 inside, and leave the refrigerator door ajar.
- To prevent problems from strong winds and hurricanes, remove all items from the balconies and the entrance courtyard.
- Close and lock all doors and windows. Close window coverings.
- Leave all closet doors and kitchen cabinets open to allow air to circulate.

A reminder to all who are planning on doing some renovations this year - PLEASE fill out the proper forms in the management office located in the Casino. The office has all the necessary forms.

We realize how difficult it can be to get a contractor to commit to a certain date, but we need time to go over your request BEFORE construction begins.

There are three signatures that are needed before your project is approved - a building or homeowner representative, an ARC representative, and someone from Property Management. Some requests may need a committee meeting to take place before the request can be answered. Please keep this in mind when submitting your forms.

Work is allowed only Monday through Friday and not on holidays or weekends. If you should have any questions about improvements or the process involved, please contact the management office.

As a reminder, if you are having work done on your home/condo and you are not here to oversee the work, PLEASE have a neighbor/friend check in on the job. This can greatly reduce the number of complaints sent to the office.

Landscaping Committee - Henri Tackett

Spring is here and the beds are showing their seasonal changes. ProCare fertilized the sod throughout the community and performed seasonal spraying for weed control as the various vines and weed types start to accelerate growth.

Many plants are pruned during this time of year to encourage renewed growth and enhance their appearance. Flower bed changes are due in May for all common areas as well as each Association. However, the Lake triangle and front entrance beds were just recently completed since those flowers were already in decline. The triangle received coleus and the front received yellow lantana. The two pots at the gatehouse exit were replaced with dipladenia and the bougainvillea potted plants were fertilized.

Winter sod replacement (from rabbit damage) was completed in the usual areas along the preserves and boardwalks where the rabbits typically feast. As most of you know, if the coyotes come during the winter months, the rabbit population declines. With very few coyotes the past two winters, the rabbits remain plentiful. ProCare also took care of a few other areas needing sod replacement.





The failing duranta plants were removed at the back of the Casino area. They were not recovering from whitefly insects and instead of replacing them, the flower beds were expanded. The dead Christmas palm

was also replaced at the north end of the upper level; although smaller than the other palms, it was replaced to maintain balance.

A few other plant changes were made. The gatehouse oak tree liriope was replaced with minima jasmine and along Osprey Drive ground cover and plantings were installed to see what will survive. The Lake received some new fakahatchee and the beach pool lantana was replaced with purple queen. The Lake Nora Grant Ixora are being monitored along with a couple of beds on the Serpentine

Walkway. Check out the agapanthus under the oak tree (across from the tennis parking lot). They are in full bloom and are lovely this time of year.



The Butterfly Garden received

some new plantings of perennial penta, lantana and a few guara, plus a cassia tree. Thanks to Ruth Finzer for providing a list of plants and working with ProCare in selecting the varieties of plants known to attract butterflies. The few existing milkweed plants were pruned to boost healthy growth. These plants are vital to monarch butterflies' growth and development as well as supporting their populations, and incredible migration. Additional plantings will be considered since it is a great way to help other pollinators too, as milkweed provides

nectar resources to a diverse suite of bees and butterflies.

The Master Board approved the replacement of the sylvester date palm on the promenade

shape, and plans are in motion to deliver and install as soon as possible. All the sylvester palms down the promenade were recently trimmed in readiness for hurricane season. Community palm and tree trimming will continue over the next several months as it does each year at this time.

Hopefully you've noticed the royal palms were freshly painted. It has been many years since the last cleaning and painting of the lower portion of their trunks. A total of 57 royals were re-painted; 33 on Association property and 24 on common property. The process promotes their overall health and helps to protect the lower portion from insects and mildew. And it enhances their appearance.


